



Dear Family,

During the 1992 LA riots, I sat and watched rioters on television screaming, "no justice, no peace." All my young mind could understand then was that if blacks could be beaten the way Rodney King was, America must be unjust. I didn't have a concrete definition of what justice was; I simply equated justice with my understanding of fairness. I didn't think it was fair for a black man to be beaten. Not so much because he was an image bearer, not even because he was innocent, but because, in my mind, a white person would never be treated in such a way. "No justice, no peace" became my cry, too. Justice is definitely no less than being fair. However, there is much more to justice than that act of being fair. Needless to say, I had some things to learn about justice … and our country.

To understand justice, we must go to the scriptures. After all, the God we serve is just (Deut. 32:4). Justice and righteousness flow from the very throne of God (Ps. 89:14). And in both the Old and New Testaments, there are passages that inform believers to live justly (Zech. 7:10; Micah 6:8; Col. 3:25; Heb. 6:10). But what does this really mean?

"He is the rock, His works are perfect, and all His ways are **just**. A faithful God who does no wrong, **upright** and **just** is He" (Deut. 32:4, emphasis mine). This passage gives us a glimpse into the character of God—His very nature is just and upright. The Hebrew definition of these words magnificently tells us who God is: honest, impartial, and fair. Regarding the Law, He is always within regulation and is never crooked, twisted, or immoral in His judgments or in His treatment of humanity. It is impossible for God to be immoral or unjust.

Unfortunately, the culture's definition of justice couldn't be further from the definition of justice we see in the character of God. A quick survey of the current cultural landscape will reveal how perverted the definition of justice has become. To do justice today, you must use a transgender person's preferred pronouns, advocate for abortion, support the redefinition of marriage, denounce the "white male patriarchy," and affirm the intersectional oppression of anyone who does not identify as a straight, white, Christian man. This is not justice. In many ways, this is the exact opposite of justice, as it initiates discriminatory practices among people groups.

It is an injustice when educators and school boards attempt to indoctrinate children into queer theory. It is an injustice when lawmakers seek to initiate socialist policies. It is an injustice to kill the unborn—not because these things go against my personal

thoughts and opinions, but because when we consider them in the light of scripture, we see that they go against the word and laws of a just God. Without God, there is no foundation for justice.

What does this mean for Christians? How must Christians think about justice? To be a follower of God means that we must do justice according to His righteous standards, not our own.

Justice is not something we scream about while actively participating in the injustices of burning buildings or murdering the innocent. As Christians, we do justice according to God's eternal moral principles. We cannot go against the standards of God to appease a lost culture. We cannot advocate for what God hates. Advocating for biblical justice will take boldness. It will take faith. It will take Christians coming together to stand, unwavering, on the truth of God's word. And, family, it will be worth it.

As we enter this new year, my prayer for you is that you will confidently stand for biblical justice even amid a culture that is screaming for the opposite.

So I had let that part of my brain kind of atrophy and this class really helped me to begin working that important part of my brain again (in regards to theology).


